

The basic unit for child protection in Iceland is the child protection committee (hereby referred to as CPC) which is responsible for child protection services at the local level. To ensure consistency, all Icelandic CPCs must work by the same classification system, as listed below.

#### I. Child maltreatment

#### Neglect

- Physical and medical neglect
- Educational neglect
- Emotional neglect
- Safety and care

#### Abuse

- Emotional abuse
- Physical abuse
- Sexual abuse




### **Definitions**

- **Reports:** Number of reports to Child Protection Committees (CPC). Number of reports may be more than the number of children being reported.
- Case: Not all reports are investigated. A report becomes a case once a decision to investigate has been made.

# Reports to CPC, by gender




# Reports to CPC and number of children




### Number of cases in child protection


(one case = one child)



### Reports to CPC and number of children, by gender




### Number of children subject of report and investigation\*




\*67-69% children who have been subject of report become subject of investigation and thereby a case.


# Number of cases, by age and year




# Proportion of cases, by age



### Reason given for reporting (%)




# Neglect – total and subcategories\*




<sup>\*</sup>A report may fall in more than one subcategory. The sum of subcategories may thus exceed the total count of reports due to neglect.

# Neglect – safety and care subcategory




25-30% of reports that fall into the *safety and care* subcategory are due to a parent's alcohol and/or substance abuse

# Abuse – total and subcategories\*




<sup>\*</sup>A report may fall in more than one subcategory. The sum of subcategories may thus exceed the total count of reports due to abuse.

## Abuse – emotional abuse subcategory




Roughly 35% of reports that fall into the *emotional abuse* subcategory are due to domestic violence

# Children's risk taking behaviour – total and subcategories\*





### Resources


- Following an investigation, there are several resources available to the family if a case has been substantiated

### CPS' resources\*




<sup>\*</sup>Number of children either receiving support within the home or have had out of home placement. Out of home placements include foster care or treatment facilities.


### CPS' resources - Support within the home




### CPS' resources – out-of-home placements




# Studlar – Acute center (14 days max.) Number of intakes




# Studlar – Acute center (14 days max.) Total number of children



# Placements in foster care within a respective year (number of children)








